St. Anthony Park pizza maker eschews the ordinary

hen you hear "pizza," do you think pepperoni?" Like burger-and-fries or peanut-butterand-jelly, pepperoni pizza is one of those edible cliches that has been around so long you wonder if the original recipe was brought down on a stone tablet by Moses. Sure, it offers the comfort of the familiar, but for diners who are out of grade school, it can get a little . . . well, boring.

But now comes St. Anthony Park resident and local restaurateur Renee Holoien. She hopes to change all that. Holoien wants to uncouple pepperoni from pizza because she thinks that pizza-lovers deserve

just as much creativity and innovation when it comes to their favorite food as does any diner at the latest upscale shrine to nouvelle cuisine. Holoien is the owner of Eat This, a Northeast Minneapolis pizzeria where only the red walls stay the same from week to week. Pizza recipes are created regularly—or whenever Holoien comes up with an idea for an interesting combination of ingredients that just might work on a medium crust.

But never say pepperoni. Holoien's creations are strictly vegetarian. You will find, as she puts it, "no dead animals on the pizza" at Eat This. Instead you may encounter pizza topped with a combination of sautéed spinach, roasted red peppers and Gruyere cheese. Or how about fresh tomatoes, roasted garlic, artichoke hearts and three kinds of Italian cheese? And those are only two of the possibilities. Holoien, a sturdy blonde who doesn't fit a single Mamma Mia stereotype, can come up with new ideas for pizza combos faster than Pizza Hut can deliver. She scours cookbooks for interesting pasta sauces, then

reworks the ingredients into new pizzas.

Unlike the average pizza place, the Eat This menu changes daily. Holoien's other innovation is selling her pizza by weight rather than by pre-determined size. "It's pizza the way they serve it on the streets of Italy," she says. "We sell pizza by the slice: cut 'em and weigh 'em.'

With servers cutting the slices according to the customer's specifications, Holoien explains, a diner at Eat This is limited only by the size of his or her appetite, not by anything so arbitrary as the idea of a "standard portion."

Eat This will celebrate its second anniversary in August. Two years ago, when choosing a name for her business, Holoien says, "I was sick of cute names. I wanted a name with a little edge, a name that's a little in your face.'

It's a fitting name for restaurant that came into business as a result of its owner's midlife

The 51-year-old Holoien explains, "I worked in information technology for 20 years. By the end of that time I was managing multi-million dollar projects for industry, but I wanted to manage a project for myself. I hear that what people regret the most at the end of their lives, sometimes, is not taking more risks. I didn't want that to be me.'

Holoien says that she loves to entertain and cook and that she's always harbored a desire to have a restaurant where "people feel comfortable being themselves." But she didn't let go of her hardheaded managerial talents just because she changed focus to a people-pleasing business. Before leaving corporate life, Holoien wrote a business plan and secured a Small Business Administration loan. While working out the financial details, she also tested

lots and lots of pizza recipes on her friends. The best ones ended up on the menu at Eat This.

It's a product development process that continues to this day, much to the delight of her friends and her life partner. Holoien says her partner takes no active role in running the restaurant, but "she's my biggest fan.'

Holoien, who is of pure Norwegian descent and grew up in Fargo, doesn't exactly have pizza in the blood, but she does have a taste for fresh starts and for setting herself

Goodwill considers move from Lauderdale

Site could become part of new highway interchange

I find a new home in the University/ Fairview area for their offices, job training programs and retail store? That is an idea Goodwill officials want to explore with community members in the weeks ahead. At a July 17 public meeting held to allow Hamline-Midway residents and business owners to comment on those plans, no one expressed any opposition to Goodwill's proposals.

In recent weeks Goodwill has also shared its plans with the Midway Chamber of Commerce's **Economic Development** Committee, the Hamline Midway Coalition and area businesses. The move would take Goodwill out of the Lauderdale home it has occupied for 25 years.

Goodwill is eyeing space near the northwest corner of Fairview and University avenues and is in negotiations to purchase properties, said Goodwill director of development Jim Roth. The agency is also nearing the end of its feasibility study of an expansion. If everything fell into place, Goodwill could move into the area by the fall of 2002.

"We believe this is a site that would work well for us," Roth said.

Roth made it clear that many things have to happen before Goodwill/Easter Seals could finalize plans to move. "We know we need to move out of our current space," he said. "But before that can happen, we want the community to better understand what Goodwill does and who we serve."

Although most people are familiar with Goodwill's retail stores, the agency also offers employment and job training for the disabled and for persons working to get off public

assistance. Goodwill works closely with businesses to provide training and to help people become selfsufficient. Those programs may not be as well-known.

In Minneapolis, Goodwill is working with eight banks to train people for teller jobs. It is also working with American Express to help that company fill 1,000 new positions in three years. Roth said similar job training opportunities could become available in St. Paul. He said Goodwill is interested in partnering with St. Paul businesses and industries to offer similar

But Goodwill has been reluctant to expand programs or renovate its current space until more is known about its future plans. Goodwill's long-time headquarters at 2543 Como Ave., near Como and Highway 280, is in an area the Minnesota Department of Transportation wants to incorporate into an expanded highway and interchange. Goodwill sold its property to the state several years ago and now leases it back. Goodwill has been on Como Avenue since 1969, in a complex that formerly was a Honeywell facility.

For more than a year Goodwill has looked at several sites. The University-Fairview area has been eyed for many months because of properties available there. One facility Goodwill is seeking to purchase is the former Mid-Continent Bottlers plant at Charles and Fairview. Mid-Continent moved to a suburban location last year.

If Goodwill does purchase the old bottling plant, the building would undergo a significant renovation, said Roth. Part of the building would be torn down and replaced with a new two-story office building. The new offices would be at the Charles and





Fairview corner. Loading docks would be moved off Charles to the north side of the building. One long-standing complaint in the area was that large beverage trucks would back into the Charles Avenue right-of-way and adjacent private parking lots when using the current building loading docks. That problem would be eliminated with an expansion.

The Charles-Fairview building would house offices as well as Goodwill's extensive job training and work readiness programs, said Roth. And what about the retail store? Goodwill is also seeking to purchase the former Abra Auto Body building on University Ave. west of Fairview, along with an adjacent parcel of land. That property is owned by the Slawik family, longtime Midway area property owners and developers. Goodwill hopes to close on the two properties in August.

Goodwill/Easter Seals has been in St. Paul for more than 80 years. Originally founded in



New permit parking policies approved

Revisions to the University of Minnesota-St. Paul campus residential permit parking policy were unanimously approved by the St. Paul City Council on July 5.

The proposed changes were developed by the St. Anthony Park Community Council after a community hearing on the issue in January. No one appeared at a June 28 public hearing to testify about the proposal.

The affected streets are sections of Chelmsford, Dudley, Hendon, Buford, Doswell, Fulham, Branston, Grantham, Hythe, Raymond and Cleveland. There are more than two dozen residential permit parking districts in St. Paul, around college and high school campuses, hospitals, busy commercial areas and

institutions. The districts allow residents to purchase permits, which enable them and their guests to park in the posted area beyond any specified time limits. While a permit is not a guarantee that a person can park in front of his or her house, the permits are meant to address parking congestion.

Antenna permit granted

US West Wireless has been granted a special condition use permit to put a cellular antenna on the St. Anthony Park Home, 2237 Commonwealth Ave.

US West wants to install three cellular antennas and one 911 emergency global positioning antenna on the roof of the nursing home. The three antennas are about nine feet long, and the global positioning antenna is about 1.5 feet long. The building

roof height is 38 feet, and the antennas will reach a maximum height of 47 feet. Equipment for the antennas will be placed by the side of the building and hidden with landscaping. Cellular antennas require a special condition use permit if they are placed on structures less than 60 feet high.

The permit was recommended for approval by city planning staff and the St. Anthony Park Community Council.

The St. Paul Planning
Commission's zoning commission
recommended approval of the
permit June 15, and the full
planning commission gave final
approval June 23. A planning
commission decision is final
unless it is appealed to the City
Council. No appeal had been filed
as of the deadline for this edition
of the Bugle.



College Park Task Force seeks tennis/basketball court funding

The College Park One Project Committee came into existence to help finance a refurbishing of the two tennis courts and basketball court in College Park, in conjunction with the new playground that will be built there. Our committee, which was designated a special task force of the St. Anthony Park Community Council, has been meeting weekly. The council is serving as fiscal agent for the task force so that contributions are tax deductible. Impress Printing on Front Street in St. Paul provided an in-kind contribution of 1500 brochures, which we're using in our fundraising efforts.

Our task force has been very busy. Based on our SAP Community Council charge, we have to report to the physical planning committee and the full council to keep them informed of our progress and activities. Community response to our efforts to get tennis and basketball courts replaced has been excellent! We even had several Park residents volunteer to obtain loans to do the courts now, and have the city pay the money back when they would have normally been replaced. We thought that was a very creative suggestion, but we subsequently learned that the city cannot do that.

We have met with Jay Benanav, our Ward 4 City Council member, and Jane

Prince, his administrative assistant. They expressed support and commitment to help complete the funding for the project, if the neighborhood also shows support. We have written several grant proposals and have just submitted a neighborhood STAR grant application-and more are in the works. Carol Madison and Melissa Mathews from the community council office and the parks and recreation department's John Wirka have been superb in helping in this effort. Jay Benanav, Rick Beeson of Park Bank and our community council have written letters in support of our funding request.

On behalf of the task force, I thank everyone who has been so generous in providing financial and in-kind contributions for this project. We have currently raised over \$10,000 in direct contributions and pledges. We have grants from the St. Anthony Park Association, Como Northtown Credit Union and the St. Anthony Park Bank. The bank has been outstanding in offering in-kind support. Park Bank's next mailing to customers in the 55108 area will include a statement asking for your financial support of the project. Also, their ad in this issue of the Bugle includes a statement supporting the project. Be sure to read it on page 8, and then, if


you haven't already, send your check to the St. Anthony Park Community Council for the College Park One Project.

John Wirka of the city parks and recreation department has cooperated with our task force. He has drafted at least four alternative plans for rebuilding the courts, trying to come up with an acceptable design that will provide adequate space and reduce costs. We also hope to obtain in-kind materials donations, which will further decrease the cost of the new courts.

Once again the community is demonstrating that we care about what happens in St. Anthony Park and are willing to do whatever it takes to maintain a wonderful area of our city and neighborhood. We know that through all of our efforts, College Park will soon have a new playground for children and new tennis and basketball courts for youth and adults. Eventually we will formally acknowledge and recognize all of you who have contributed to this project. In the meantime, thanks to each of you who have helped and will help in this effort!





Boston more than a century ago, Goodwill got its local start in facilities in downtown St. Paul in 1919. Its first board chairperson was Dr. Frank A. Cone, a longtime resident of Como Park and St. Anthony Park. Cone was a former pastor at St. Anthony Park United Methodist Church. Goodwill was Cone's second career after he retired from the ministry.

What has made Goodwill unique among social service agencies is its long-standing focus on helping people help themselves. Its job training programs have increased significantly over the years. For many years Goodwill workers

spent much of their time repairing donated goods for resale. Now broken items or items needing repair are not accepted as

As government programs to help the unemployed grew in the 1930s and 1940s, Goodwill shifted its focus to help the disabled find employment. Employment programs grew, some offered in conjunction with the St. Paul Society for the Blind in the 1950s and 1960s. In the 1980s, there was a shift back to training people for jobs in the community as more disabled workers were mainstreamed into the larger work force.



challenging goals.

Opening a restaurant is not the only radical change of direction to be found on her résumé. In 1984, she earned a doctorate in South Asian languages for the study and translation of the "earliest text on classical Indian music theory." Holoien says that she never intended to pursue an academic career. "At the time, I wanted to complete the Ph.D., not for the future, but because it was something very difficult."

As a result, it is probably safe to say that Holoien is the only Sanskrit-speaking pizzeria owner in Minnesota.

She's an unusual employer in some other ways as well. "I pay good wages," she claims proudly. "My employees all get health

benefits. I promote diversity with a lot of world music at the restaurant, from Latin music, to rhythm-and-blues, to Greek or Asian music, to jazz."

There's a pause, and then she adds a little defiantly, as if daring the listener to credit such an odd philanthropic impulse, "And when I make a profit, I'm going to tithe."

Meanwhile, there's the perfect pizza to conjure up. It's a topic that takes Holoien only a minute of thought. Dreamy-eyed, she names the ingredients: "fresh porcini mushrooms, Gorgonzola and mild Provolone cheese." She muses a moment before the practical project manager who honed her skills in corporate America resurfaces. "It would be a great pizza, but it would be too expensive to sell," she concludes regretfully.
